







9. What is the effect of seeing the Boston Tea Party through the eyes of Captain Hall? What is the author's purpose for showing two major events that led to the American Revolution through a British viewpoint?

10. How does Franklin see his treatment at the hearing as a "symptom of the great illness still spreading between the crown and its colonies?" In your answer, please address the literary aspects of the quotes (i.e. literary technique used and purpose) as well as the historical analysis.

11. Discuss the differences in the reactions of Adams and Gage to the caravan of colonists bringing food and goods into Boston.

12. What do the delegates hope to accomplish from meeting together? When they leave Philadelphia what policies have been agreed upon?

13. What do Strahan's comments reveal about Thomas Paine.

14. What does Shaara's description of Paul Revere's ride to Lexington reveal about the man himself, the event and its historical significance.

15. What are the problem's Pitcairn faces as he attempts to march his troops to Lexington? What does this foreshadow about many of the future battles in the revolution?



20. What metaphor does Sam Adams use to explain to John Adams the attitudes of the congress? Explain the significance of this.
21. Abigail Adams makes some interesting points to her husband about the future government of the colonies. Discuss two of her points and the validity of them (remember to discuss these in light of the past and present time).
22. What does Thomas Paine's *Common Sense* provide for the American cause that has been lacking until now? Explain why this an effective and possibly an ineffective measure (then and now).

23. Discuss some of the problems Washington faces as general of the colonial army. Include in the discussion, how he solves these problems and his effectiveness as a general.
24. In the section beginning on p. 485 and ending at the bottom of p. 489, Shaara distinctly changes his prose style. His sentences are either shorter, or broken up more into phrases surrounded by commas. The dialog also consists of much shorter phrases. What effect is Shaara trying to produce in the reader? Explain why and its effectiveness.
25. Describe Thomas Jefferson and his writing of the *Declaration of Independence* as he is depicted in the book. What does this tell you about the man and the history.
