

FFA FarmBot: Changing today's classroom for tomorrow

Could you ever imagine experiencing learning from a robot to gain knowledge in a classroom? Today, current BKW students in the Future Farmers of America (FFA) program are doing just that! Built and introduced during the 2020-21 school year, the FarmBot is assisting students with learning about the basic principles of science, identifying important solutions for soil, all while identifying ways to improve today's approach to agriculture. The newly installed FarmBot is currently in use in the BKW Secondary School and students are taking a first-hand approach

to learning. It is the only FarmBot currently in use in an Albany County FFA classroom. The best part? The technology was secured by a federal grant at no cost to district taxpayers.

According to the Farmbot website, over 500 educational institutions have integrated FarmBot into their curriculum. The technology allows for today's students to learn how to become engaged with research, experimentation, while gaining an immediate connection to their curriculum.

"Technology continues to play an important role in our

In his new role, Mr. Tidd will work to prepare students for success in college or future career paths through internship support and career exploration.

"At BKW, we continue a strong commitment in allowing our students to achieve their educational and career goals," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Mundell. "We are excited to add Mr. Tidd to the role of College Career Readiness coordinator, while continuing to build our ability to assist and celebrate the achievements of our secondary students."

Mr. Tidd has been a teacher in the BKW district for nearly 16 years, having taught second, fifth and sixth grade classrooms.

To celebrate this important recognition, we are sharing an in-depth Q&A with Mr. Tidd on his thoughts on being named the College Career Readiness coordinator, while understanding his goals and preparation for today's students:

How will this new role impact your outreach with BKW students?

Having taught 2nd, 5th and most recently, 6th grade has allowed me the

opportunity to watch our students grow from their youngest years, to adolescence/early adulthood. I believe that by educating our students at all grade levels about the many pathways to graduation and beyond, we can have an immediate impact on their success. The design of our district campus and the

close proximity of the elementary and middle/ high school will allow for collaboration between buildings, while reaching out to former BKW students will help to highlight the many opportunities for post-graduate plans.

As a College Career Readiness Coordinator, what mindset do you take into the position to improve opportunities for BKW High School students?

I trust that there is a pathway to success for everyone. What is the right path for one, may not be the best option for others. By collaborating with my colleagues and meeting with students, a priority is to educate our secondary learners on all of their choices post-graduation; allowing them the opportunity to explore options of which they might not be aware. I also hope to foster a sense of self-efficacy amongst the students, encouraging them to keep an open mind while considering their plans after high school.

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BKW Elementary to launch 'Start with Hello' campaign

Beginning this fall, BKW Elementary staff and students will begin participating in a nationwide program supported by the Sandy Hook Promise Foundation. The program, called 'Start with Hello," encourages students to learn basic opportunities to engage one another by saying "hello" to a fellow student as a way to possibly start a friendship, or better yet, to let someone know a classmate is there to listen. The program is part of a student outreach program developed by the Sandy Hook Promise Foundation, which is a national nonprofit organization founded and led by several family members whose loved ones were killed at Sandy Hook Elementary School on December 14, 2012.

"Simple acts of kindness can create an immediate change in the day of a student," said Berne-Knox-Westerlo Elementary School Principal Mrs. Landry. "In what might feel like a small gesture to some, can make someone else's day that much better. With this program, we are

this conversation on our campus."

The current program is more than just video gaming, it also falls perfectly into STEM (Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) development for students. To put its importance into perspective, The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that STEM occupations will grow by 8.0% between 2018-2029, compared with 3.7% for non-STEM jobs. That is not a huge leap, but is progressively foreshadowing the importance of STEM and its role in supporting academic success inside the classroom.

"By listening to our community and understanding our students' needs, we are continuing to deliver a forward-thinking curriculum that prepares students for the future," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Timothy Mundell. Our students are becoming engaged with their course work and having fun exploring new and exciting employment opportunities."
