BKW residents to vote on budget proposal on May 20

On May 20, Berne-Knox-Westerlo residents will decide on a proposed \$24,737,328 spending plan for the 2025-26 school year. Under the proposal, spending would decrease by 4.08% from the current year.

The spending decrease is a result of the district supplementing its past revenue with its fund balance and reserves over the past several years. This year's budget will limit usage of the reserve funds for the upcoming school year.

This year's proposal seeks to realign spending and prepare the district to rebuild reserves to navigate the current financial landscape facing districts throughout New York State. The proposed budget for 2025-26 seeks to maintain all programs, staff, and services for next year and will add two cost-saving self-contained special education classroom spaces to the elementary and high school campus, while re-establishing the district's School Resource Officer to provide safety and security on our school campus.

The proposed budget carries a 3.3% tax levy increase which is within the district's assigned tax levy "cap" of 3.3% as defined by New York's tax levy cap legislation. A simple majority of voters (50% plus one) is needed to pass the budget.

The 2025-26 budget also addresses factors related to current economic conditions, such as rising transportation expenses, utility and heating costs, increasing insurance and retirement premiums.

"The 2025-26 budget will continue our district's commitment to our students, families, and school community," said Superintendent of Schools Bonnie Kane. "Our budget will focus on providing diverse curriculum offerings, allow for supportive outreach through clubs, programs, and activities, and build supportive social-emotional connections so students can learn and grow in a safe and healthy environment."

FINANCIAL LITERACY OFFERS RESPONSIBLE PLANNING FOR STUDENTS

Financial literacy is a valuable skill at any age, and at BKW, we aim to make financial literacy accessible from the start, helping students lay the groundwork for confident money management as they prepare for life after graduation. For many students, an introduction to maintaining their finances allows them to understand how to maintain or improve their financial lifestyle.

"Personal finances play an important role in everyone's lives," shared BKW Mathematics Teacher Mr. Morin. "To have an opportunity to introduce this topic at the high school level allows our students to get a better understanding of how to save, plan, and enjoy their future savings responsibly while improving budgeting skill sets. It's a great course for our students to have access to, especially at this stage of their life."



On the ballot:

PROPOSITION 1

Vote on a \$24,737,328 proposed budget for the 2025-26 school year.

PROPOSITION 2

Vote to approve the purchase of three (3) diesel school buses at a cost to not exceed \$523,894.

PROPOSITION 3

Vote to establish a Facilities Reserve Fund in an amount to not exceed \$2,000,000 within a term of ten (10) years.

PROPOSITION 4

Vote to establish a 2025 Transportation Reserve Fund in an amount to not exceed \$2,000,000 within a term of ten (10) years.

BOARD ELECTION

Elect two members of the Board of Education to a three (3) year term commencing on July 1, 2025, and expiring June 30, 2028, to succeed Matthew Tedeschi and Rebecca Miller whose terms expire on June 30, 2025. Matthew Tedeschi and Rebecca Miller will be running for re-election during this year's budget vote.

BKW MUSIC DEPARTMENT BUILDING CREATIVE STEAM

In just two years and under the leadership of BKW Music Teachers Mrs. Higgins and Mr. Slingerland, the district has reestablished itself in the wonderful world of music and choral competition. VOTER ELIGIBILITY

All voters must be U.S. citizens, age 18 or older, and be residents of the district for at least 30 days before the vote. Preregistration is required. You may be asked to show proof of residency (such as a valid ID that lists your address) when voting. ABSENTEE BALLOTS and EARLY VOTING

Absentee ballot voting is available. The new Early Mail Voter Act allows for early voting via mail without any reasons needed for voting early. You must fill out an application to vote by early or absentee ballot. There are separate applications for voting by early voting or absentee ballot, but the application process and deadlines are the same. To receive an application, contact the District Clerk Anne Farnam at (518) 872-1293 ext. 5133. If you request a ballot mailed, your application must be received by 5 p.m. on May 13, 2025. If you plan to pick up your ballot, your application must be received by 5 p.m. on May 20, 2025.
