

Q&A: What to know about the Capital Project

On Monday, November 10, district residents will vote to approve a \$5.142 million capital project to replace the roofs of the elementary and secondary schools. In the northeast, the expected lifespan of a roof, considering local weather conditions, typically ranges from 15 to 20 years.

Currently, our elementary and secondary roofs are well beyond their extended lifespan of 30 years.

Why is the district choosing this project for the school community?

Over the past several years, our facilities team has worked diligently to extend the life of the roof. Unfortunately, it is no longer financially sensible to continue to patch the roof and repair damage caused by outside elements. A complete renovation is required to improve infrastructure and building integrity. In addition, structural concerns with the roof were identified by architects completing a Building Conditions Survey. This survey is completed, by regulation, every five to ten years. Information gathered from that survey highlighted an immediate need to address this issue.

Will the capital project receive state aid?

Yes, this capital project will receive state aid upon completion. The district will receive over 79% in building aid, which will help alleviate the financial impact on the community. If approved by voters, construction is scheduled to begin in the spring, with completion expected by September 2026. The district is selecting this timetable for the project to ensure competitive bids in the best financial interest of our community.

What benefits does this project offer our community?

At BKW, we have strengthened resources for all students, from creating a learning campus focused on Career and Technical Education (CTE) opportunities to improved learning spaces and a campus that engages students from our youngest students to graduating seniors. As our campus grows with opportunities, so does the responsibility to ensure our investments stay safe and sound while delivering the educational experiences we've come to learn and enjoy. This capital project will enable the school district to keep our resources protected for years to come.

BKW winter weather schedules and procedures

As we approach the winter months, we'd like to share important information on school delays, cancellations, and additional items related to inclement weather. As always, student health and safety remain top priorities in our district.

The superintendent may choose to close school or delay for inclement weather, hazardous road conditions, or other scenarios. The district's one-hour and two-hour delay procedures are as follows:.

If it appears that students cannot be transported safely to school at the usual time in the morning, but that the weather will allow a safe afternoon dismissal, the district may institute a one- or two-hour delay to the start of the school day. When there is a one-hour delay, the bus will arrive one hour later than the usual pickup time. So, if the normal morning pickup time for your student(s) is 7:15 a.m., the bus will arrive one hour after that time at 8:15 a.m. The same principle applies to a two-hour delay.

On mornings when the weather is inclement and road conditions are poor, families will be notified between 5:30 and 6:00 a.m. if:

- School is running on a 1-hour delay
- School is running on a 2-hour delay (delayed decision on closing by 7 a.m.)
- Schools are closed

Unless otherwise announced, if the district is closed, all events hosted in the buildings would also be canceled for the day.

Please note that weather-related announcements are made on local TV stations, on our website, and through ParentSquare.

Please ensure that your contact information is updated within our system and that you are receiving Parent Square communications from the district.

As a reminder, school districts across New York State must be in session for a minimum of 180 days. As a district, it is imperative that we satisfy this requirement and receive 100% of our state funding to support everything we provide to our students.

District adds AED for campus safety

The district recently received an Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) from Zoll Medical, through a partnership with Coro Medical | AED.US. This donation is part of a national

year-long initiative to provide one free AED to school districts. AEDs play a central role in allowing qualified staff to increase the survival rate of individuals suffering from a sudden cardiac arrest. The donated AED was delivered by Zoll Medical Senior Channel Partner Manager and BKW parent Matthew Monroe.

This year, Governor Kathy Hochul signed a bill into law, known as Desha's Law, that requires New York State public schools to implement cardiac emergency report plans to accompany their yearly school safety plans on school campuses. As a result of this law, all districts in New York State are required to have a comprehensive cardiac emergency plan in place by Dec. 21, 2025.
